



August is a great time to explore the Oregon Coast Range. We've named several of our favorite cheeses for Headlands which were important to navigation in years gone by, as well as Coastal Mountains rich in wildlife. These select cheeses are smooth and dense when young, aging to savory, piquant cream held within a velvety rind.

The *Cape Foulweather* is a pyramid, lightly dusted with ash.

"... at the northern extreme, the land formed a point, which I called Cape Foul Weather, from the very bad weather that we, soon after, met with." - Captain James Cook , March 1778

Our *Humbug Mountain* is an ash-coated truncated pyramid.

Originally named Sugarloaf Mountain, this ocean promontory was renamed by a group of disgruntled explorers who became lost in the 1850s while hiking up the south slope.

Each square *Euchre Mountain* is filled with the bite of black peppercorns.

The name of this mountain may come from the Yukichetunne (Tututni) Indians. North of Logsden and the town of Siletz, the peak rises to 2,446 feet high.

Average weight: 5 ounces*

* Note: Because we hand-ladle and hand-pack our cheeses, the individual weights will vary.

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
